The new job and careers section consists of an annotated links list to nearly 20 job search websites specific to the wood industry and related education as well as annotated links to websites that provide career path information and job profiles.

Other new adds include a link to the **Wood Industry Education LinkedIn** group and the capability to e-mail any relevant page to yourself, friend or family to review on your own time.
