## Resources for Schools with Woodworking and Related Technology Programs

## Association of Woodworking & Furnishings Suppliers® (AWFS) is a



101-year old, California-based trade association for the secondary wood products manufacturing industry serving the residential and commercial markets. AWFS offers an Educational Institute membership which, for a nominal fee, provides complimentary access to the AWFS Fair and its educational programs. ## **Programs of AWFS:**

- **AWFS®Fair** is a national biennial trade show held in odd-numbered years in Las Vegas, Nevada for the woodworking supply and machinery manufacturers industry catering to cabinetmakers, furniture makers and others manufacturing wood products, as well as to educators who attend the show. All teachers receive free entry to the AWFS®Fair, reduced prices on the Teacher Track seminars designed expressly for educators and the opportunity to network with industry professionals. A highlight of the show is the AWFS-sponsored Fresh Wood Student Woodworking Competition. <u>www.AWFSFair.org</u>
- College of Woodworking Knowledge (CWWK) is the educational seminar program of the AWFS®Fair, featuring over 50 seminars on industry topics such as software and technology, techniques and application, handcrafted furniture, cabinet and millwork and more. Each seminar is taught by experienced professionals within the industry. The SMART (Special Machinery and Relevant Technology) seminars take place on the show floor and focus on machinery and technology topics. All seminars are open to educators; the Teacher Track seminars are geared specifically to educators teaching woodworking in the educational setting. www.AWFSFair.org
- Fresh Wood Student Woodworking Competition is the biennial student competition of the AWFS®Fair, showcasing the best of student woodworking talent across North America. It is open to high school and post-secondary students. Competition finalists, their projects and their teachers are brought to the AWFS®Fair in Las Vegas for the crowd-pleasing and artful display, final judging and accolades from industry. The Best of Show winner takes home a wood sculpture designed by renowned craftsman, Sam Maloof. AWFS produces a 4-color book of the student work after the show.
