

Legislative Priorities

<u>Freedom to Invest in Tomorrow's Workforce Act</u>: permits the use of 529 account funds to pay for post-secondary training programs. This will help more Americans obtain and retain well-paying jobs that don't require a traditional four-year degree.

ProvideS tax-advantaged resources to families, students, and workers — regardless of whether they possess a
college degree — pursuing career growth, mid-career changes, or pathways diverging from traditional academic
routes.

Protecting American Industry and Labor from International Trade Crimes Act.: Establishes a new task force or similar structure within the DOJ's Criminal Division to investigate and prosecute trade-related crimes.

- Enhances nationwide responses to trade-related offenses by providing training and technical assistance to other federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies, expanding investigations and prosecutions, and allowing for parallel criminal and civil enforcement actions.
- Requires the Attorney General to submit an annual report to Congress assessing the DOJ's efforts, statistics on trade-related crimes, and fund utilization.
- Authorizes funding for FY26 to support these efforts with appropriate guardrails.

S. 1094 Mass Timber Federal Buildings Act

The bipartisan Mass Timber Federal Buildings Act
 —which is cosponsored by Oregon's U.S. Senator
 Ron Wyden and Idaho's U.S. Senator Mike Crapo—
 would incentivize the use of mass timber building
 materials by providing a preference in federal
 building contracts for mass timber products, giving
 mass timber companies the ability to compete for
 federal construction, renovation, or acquisition of
 public buildings and for military construction.

H.R. 262 Disaster Reforestation Act

 Disaster Reforestation Act This bill establishes a special rule for casualty losses of uncut timber from fire, storm, or other casualty, or from theft. The basis for determining the amount of the deduction for such loss shall not be less than the excess of (1) the appraised value of such timber determined immediately before the loss was sustained, over (2) the salvage value of the timber.





Skilled and Motivated Students to the Workforce

The woodworking industry has seen fluctuations over the decades. In the early 2000s, the Bureau of Labor Statistics reported approximately 600,000 woodworking professionals.

However, recent estimates suggest a decline, with current numbers hovering around 450,000. This reduction highlights the need for strategic intervention to revitalize the sector.

Bridging the Skills Gap: CTE programs can provide targeted training in modern woodworking techniques and technologies, equipping workers with the skills employers need.

Attracting New Talent: By offering clear career pathways and opportunities for advancement, CTE can attract younger individuals to the woodworking industry.

Freedom to Invest in Tomorrow's Workforce Act H.R.1151

 The legislation aims to broaden the scope of qualified expenses under 529 savings plans to include postsecondary training and credentialing, including licenses and non-governmental certifications. The bill would provide taxadvantaged resources to families, students, and workers — regardless of whether they possess a college degree — pursuing career growth, midcareer changes, or pathways diverging from traditional academic routes.

Fair Trade Practices

maintain quality standards in the
woodworking industry. It discourages the
import of substandard or illegally sourced
wood products that can undermine the
reputation and integrity of American-made
goods.

Strengthening Domestic Supply Chains H.R.1869 encourages the use of domestically sourced materials, strengthening American supply chains and reducing dependence on potentially unreliable or unethical international sources. This stability is crucial for the long-term health of the woodworking industry.

Promoting Sustainable Practices
The act supports sustainable forestry
practices by addressing illegal logging and
trade. It helps ensure that wood products
are sourced responsibly, promoting
environmental stewardship and long-term
resource availability.

H.R.1869 - Protecting American Industry and Labor from International Trade Crimes Act of 2025

 Protecting American Industry and Labor from International Trade Crimes Act of 2025 This bill requires the Department of Justice (DOJ) to establish a new task force, named program, or similar structure to investigate and prosecute trade-related crimes, with particular emphasis on violations of laws and regulations relating to U.S. imports and exports, trade-based money laundering, and smuggling. DOJ must also increase the capabilities and capacity of the Criminal Division to prosecute such crimes, and increase prosecutions of such crimes.

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S. 383 JOBS Act of 2025

Jumpstart Our Businesses by Supporting Students
 Act of 2025 or the JOBS Act of 20 2025 This bill
 extends the Job Training Federal Pell Grant
 Program to certain career and technical education
 programs at institutions of higher education (IHEs)
 that provide at least 150 and 600 clock hours of
 instructional time over a period of at least eight
 weeks and not more than 15 weeks. The bill defines
 eligible career pathway programs as programs that
 (1) are listed on the provider list of the Workforce
 Innovation and Opportunity Act; (2) are part of a
 career pathway; and (3) are aligned to a program
 of study as defined in the Carl D. Perkins Career
 and Technical Education Act of 2006.

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
